SKYWARNTM Spotter Training

The last time the National Weather Service was at a RARA meeting was March 2006 and it is time to renew our SKYWARNTM training. SKYWARNTM Spotter Training is good for 3 years. The training is not only for amateur radio operators but for anyone with an interest in weather and reporting on severe weather events back to the NWS office in Buffalo. Severe weather events can be reported via designated ham radio repeaters, telephone, or the website. **Judy Levan, N2TEZ**, will be our special guest for this free training. Judy is the Warning Coordination Meteorologist at the Buffalo office. The following information comes directly from the Buffalo NWS web site.

"SKYWARN™ is a national effort to save lives during severe weather emergencies with an expanding network of trained weather spotters. The services performed by SKYWARN™ spotters have saved many lives.

The National Weather Service has a number of devices for detecting severe thunderstorms. Included in these are Doppler radar, satellite, and lightning detection networks. However, the most important tool for observing thunderstorms is the trained eye of the storm spotter.

By providing observations, SKYWARN™ spotters assist National Weather Service members in their warning decisions and enable

the National Weather Service to fulfill its mission of protecting life and property. Storm spotters are, and always will be, an indispensable part of the severe local warning program."

The old telephone workers in attendance, the jacks and wires crew, were dazzled by such terms as fiber optics, pulse code modulation, light emitting diodes and other such backgrounds forming the new *intelligent network*.

The March RDXA meeting, using the 111 Westfall Road venue, featured a slide program on the then recently completed VR6HI DX'pedition to Pitcairn Island.

Being March, it must be close to the anticipated first hamfest of the year and that was always the Drumlins Hamfest at the Marbletown Fire Hall. Four dollars got you admission to the March 25th event.

Wayne King, N2WK, writing for the Rochester VHF Group, reported on the results of the January VHF contest and the winners of the *Rochester Cup Award*. This local contest within a contest was devised to promote local activity in the ARRL VHF SS contest and to bolster the RVHFG club contest score. The RDXA won the club category led by Frank, K2OS, and the grid hopping team of KB2WN, K1JUL and N2HKD. Second place club score was taken by the Xerox Club with WB2ELB and WB2SUN leading their effort. In third place was RaRa, turning in the most logs at 21, but not having enough Q's to hold their previous 2nd place spot. The new Rochester Cup challenge proved very successful with over eight local clubs from Batavia to Newark turning in scores.



Sidebands: Amateur Radio in the News

IRC Featured on the News. WFYI-TV of Indianapolis aired a segment on the Indianapolis Radio Club, which dates back to 1914. The clip features recent contesting activities by the group. New FCC Enforcement Chief. Laura L. Smith will replace Riley Hollingsworth, K4ZDH, as Special Counsel for the Spectrum Enforcement Division of the FCC's Enforcement Bureau. Hollingsworth retired in 2008 after serving more than 10 years in enforcement over the Amateur Radio Service. Smith graduated from Pepperdine University School of Law and is no stranger to the FCC. She previously worked there in the Mass Media Bureau and Wireless Telecommunications Bureau. She also served as Deputy Division Chief of the Public Safety and Private Wireless Division. Smith is no stranger to issues in wireless communication either. In 1998, Smith left the FCC to become Executive Director of Governmental Affairs for the Industrial Telecommunications Association (ITA), now Enterprise Wireless Alliance. In that role, she monitored FCC and legislative proceedings and participated in all regulatory proceedings relevant to the private wireless industry. In 2001, Smith became ITA's President and Chief Executive Officer. While in that position, she was instrumental in the formation of the Consensus Group, a group of public safety and private wireless entities responsible for drafting the "Consensus Plan." a proposed resolution for interference in the 800 MHz band. The plan was adopted by the FCC in 2004. Prior to taking over for Hollingsworth, Smith served Of Counsel with the Maryland law firm of Shulman Rogers. While there her specialization was telecommunications and she worked with clients in the private radio and public safety communities. I should note she is not a licensed ham, but of course that might change as she interacts more with our community. (Source: The ARRL Letter).

DTV Delayed. Just as our local hams joined others around the country in a volunteer effort to assist folks with questions about DTV, it looks like the transition to only-digital broadcasting has been delayed. The House of Representatives voted 264-158 in favor of delaying the transition to June 12, 2009. The Senate voted unanimously in favor of the bill.

As of this writing, a White House spokesperson indicated that President Obama will sign the bill into law. The bill was prompted by concerns that millions of Americans with analog TVs who receiver over-the-air signals are not ready for the transition. Funding for discount coupons for digital converter boxes had been exhausted creating somewhat of a bottleneck for people who are not ready to receive over-the-air digital TV signals. The rationale of the bill is that the extra time will allow more public education about DTV and unused coupons will expire which would free up funds to issue new converter coupons. Logbook of the World Improved. In order to better accommodate new users as well as existing account holders, ARRL's Logbook of The World (LoTW) has been updated (Go to http://www.arrl.org/lotw/). According to ARRL Membership and Volunteer Programs Assistant Manager Norm Fusaro, W3IZ, these improvements were made based LoTW help questions and listening to users. The upgrades include the following: [1] An LoTW User's Corner that includes quick links to log onto your RaRa Rag 4

account, save or renew a certificate and ways to address PC failure. [2] The GET STARTED section (See

http://www.arrl.org/lotw/start.html) has been simplified with links for each of the four steps in the certificate process. [3] LoTW instructions are now available in nine languages: English, Dutch, French, German, Italian, Russian, Slovenian and Spanish. Options to select a language have always been available, but they have now been moved up front to the GET STARTED page. The languages are identified with icons of flags to represent each language. [4] The GET STARTED pdf file has been updated to include new screenshots and refinement of some of the processes. [5] The software download section now consists of only three icons representing the three operating systems for which software is available: Windows, Mac and Linux. The user simply selects their operating system and they are redirected to the download specific to their system. [6] A new link has been added for QSL Manager, Club Calls and DXpeditions. This link gives details on establishing an account for these special operations and includes a section for 1x1 call signs. [7] A new PowerPoint overview is available from the LoTW site. This presentation has also been added to our multimedia library (Go to http://www.arrl.org/multimedia). The program is an overview of LoTW and what users can expect from the service. There are screenshots of LoTW pages, as well as a condensed version of the certificate and award application process. [The ARRL Letter]

YouTube Ham College. Want some information on ham radio in a video format? Search YouTube. For starters, go to http://www.youtube.com and search K7AGE. He has contributed a number of well-crafted videos running about 15 minutes each on PSK31, IMD, Digipan, and soundcard interfaces. There are lots of other ham radio clips by other folks — just search a ham-related keyword. Perhaps it will inspire you to produce your own educational clip.

Roll Your Own Triode. Are tubes getting difficult to find? Why not make your own? Go to http://tinyurl.com/bhf9p7 to view a high quality video of a triode being made from scratch on the workbench. The captions are in French, but most are easy to decipher, such as "les electrodes." (RaRa member W2ZEY reads French and can translate the rest.) The video also demonstrates the triode being used in homebrew radios. The clip runs 17 minutes in length and is a "must see."

A Salt-Water Dummy Load? Sure, why not? You will need a suitable container with an airtight lid, copper wire electrodes, a UHF connector, some water and some salt. It is highly recommended that an antenna analyzer be used to create the correct concentration of salt for a 1:1 SWR. And you can even be creative about the type of container. How about a Grecian urn? An Egyptian sarcophagus? Or a Corona beer bottle? Skeptical? Visit: http://tinyurl.com/b4zn8k to see how it is done. By the way, Professor I. M. Zapped takes no responsibility whatsoever for your transceiver or the results, which depend on how well you follow the instructions. Any questions should be directed to K5LXP, the designer.

W1AW to QSY on 160 Meters. Starting Monday, March 9, Maxim Memorial Station W1AW will be using a new 160-meter frequency for its CW transmissions. To accommodate increasing activity near the current bulletin frequency of 1817.5 kHz, W1AW will move to 1802.5 kHz to reduce the possibility of interference.

HOW DOES SKYWARNTM WORK WITH AMATEUR RADIO? "Amateur radio volunteers operate a base station at the Buffalo Weather Service Office during severe weather or other weather disaster emergencies. Through a network of repeater antennas, volunteers at the Buffalo office contact other amateurs -located in communities throughout Western New York. Storm information is collected at the base station for rapid relay by forecasters to the media, Emergency Management and Law Enforcement agencies, and the public."

WHY DO HAMS MAKE GOOD SKYWARN[™] SPOTTERS? "Hams operate on emergency power when commercial power is lost so reports can still be received. Reports are received in a timely, efficient manner. Unlike police, fire, and other government emergency response persons, amateur radio operators have no jurisdictional boundaries. Amateur radio spotters are able and willing to perform their service for extended periods. SKYWARNTM spotters are trained have knowledge of severe weather to characteristics not only to ensure they are able to recognize these, but also to avoid erroneously reporting nonhazardous conditions. In Western New York, any amateur radio operator can become a SKYWARN[™] spotter."
