A long time RaRa member, Lucille had not been active on-theair for many years. She was introduced to ham radio through marriage to her husband who had been licensed pre-war. Being a blind person, it was thought that ham radio would help her reach out and meet people she would otherwise not be able to come in contact with. It worked. Lucille became very active, first on AM phone and then HF SSB and finally she was often heard on 2 meter FM. She enjoyed FM repeater operation and operating in VHF FM contests during the heyday of that era.

Lucille's greatest contribution came in the 1950's and 1960's when she ran across, on 20 meter SSB, some Navy personnel trying to establish phone patch contacts from the Antarctica to their stateside homes. "I can do this," she declared. Soon she had a phone patch hooked up, with the help of her long time friend and technical support guy, Len Gessin, WA2ZNC, and she was in business. It was like she was born to do this. Night after night she spent hours, especially at holiday times, running phone patches from the Antarctica to the homes of many lonely GI's. Soon she added a large linear amplifier and finally a 4 element 20 meter mono-bander was installed to assure the GI's got telephone quality connections via ham radio.

As technology changed and stranded Navy personnel got use of satellite phones and the like, the need for phone patching fell off. Lucille was not forgotten however. In an official proclamation the Navy Department made her an official member of the Task Force she served so well; she was given an official Navy leather flight jacket, just like the men wore and her walls were covered with letters of thanks and commendation.

Some years ago it was this writer who received a call from Lucille stating she had to have a new roof installed and would I take down her antennas. It was a sad day when the big yagi came down, the faithful but tired Drake equipment was retired and W2SCI went QRT. Lucille passed away, suddenly, quietly and in peace, February 21, 2009.

On the hobby side of things I enjoy contesting as a "little pistol" using SSB and RTTY. Contests are a great way to fatten the logbook and measure the capabilities of your station. I am an active user of both LoTW and eQSL. I recently got my WAS RTTY using LoTW. I am also an active member of the VE testing team and belong to RDXA and the ARES/RACES group.

RaRa Rag 20 Years Ago: May, 1989

Bob made it possible to bring an esoteric amateur topic front and center by inviting Bill McDonnell, KG2F, and Peter Neenos, K2EXN, to speak on amateur television. Aiding in the presentation was a video tape of the repeater, the repeater site and various off-air signals showing the capabilities. Also that night was the RaRa Annual meeting with elections.

Ed Holdsworth, N2EH, penned an article on the pending Rochester Hamfest scheduled for May 19-21, and promised a bigger and improved event.

The only cable television network then operating was *Greater Rochester Cablevision*, or GRC. GRC wrote an article in this issue stating that they were initiating a large scale program to reduce cable leakage in the Rochester area. Cable leakage was of particular interest to amateurs as our signals could gain access to the cable and signals leaking out of the cable were often causing interference to VHF operations. The article went on to offer a telephone number to call to report cable leakage problems and to expect a fast response.

The general meeting will be May 8th at 7:30PM. The group will continue the celebration of our 60th year and will hold general elections for board of director positions.


